Section and Dr. Luke, Veterinarian gave their section's activity reports.



# Health District Boosts Planning

The Snohomish Health District board agreed Tuesday to father comprehensive health planning for the county.

The board unanimously consented to act as the legal authority through which funds can be given by the federal government either to the county or individual communities.

An organization involving hundreds of county citizens will be created with health planning committees in each of the 18 Snohomish County communities. David Stockton, coordinator for the new organization, may be contacted by interested city councils.

Federal funds will be given through the Department of Health, Education and Welfare on a regional basis. Snohomish County will be in the four-county Puget Sound area.

The health district board underwent reorganization yesterday in the first meeting since the new fiscal year.

Al Kincaid of Edmonds was elected new chairman with

county Commissioner Dick Forsgren acting as vice chairman. New members of the board, which represents all communities and the county, are Bill Langus and Moe Michelson of Everett.

Jim Hutchins of Lynnwood has been appointed to replace Forsgren as Lynnwood City Council representative.

Whether the health district can approve community sewage holding facilities for new plats will be discussed at a future meeting.

So far county sanitarians only have approved septic tanks where soil is perkable, but the county's development of housing could be speeded up considerably if holding tanks were permitted in areas where sewer treatment is proposed within the next year or two.

Currently community holding tanks — which would be emptied by an authorized sewage disposal district — fall under the jurisdiction of the State Health Department and the Water Pollution Control Commission.





Gentlemen:

Reference is made to a letter dated November 19, 1968, addressed to you from the District Engineer of Alderwood Water District, Mr. Erikson. This letter explained conditions under which the district would accept, maintain, and operate certain interim sewerage systems for plats within the district.

Because Mr. Erikson's letter stated that the water district would agree to a sewer system discharging to a central septic tank and drain field, there may be an assumption on your part that this arrangement is acceptable to the State Department of Health. In fact, we have indications that there are some developers in Snohomish County who have already gained this impression.

All plans and specifications for sewer construction and for pumping and treatment facilities must be submitted to both the State Department of Health and the Water Pollution Control Commission for approval prior to construction. Under current policy, plans for sewers will not be approved where the means of treatment is by septic tank. In those instances where we will approve interim treatment and disposal methods, primary treatment is the minimum acceptable degree of treatment; and, where no adequate stream or other waterway is available, discharge must be to a spray irrigation field. In each case, there is a limitation on how long such interim facilities may be continued in use, after which time interception by some ultimate system must be accomplished.

Because the circumstances surrounding different developments can be so varied, we feel it advisable that developers be referred to either this office or to the Water Pollution Control Commission in the early stages of their projects so they may inform themselves on what the requirements for sewerage and disposal will be.

Should you wish a more detailed statement of our policies relating to methods and conditions for interim sewage treatment facilities, we invite you to contact this office at your convenience.

# Buy Big Computer

By 1971 as many as 200,000 tax statements will be produced by the computer in less than 24 hours. Today the work takes scores of workers in several departments approximately five months.

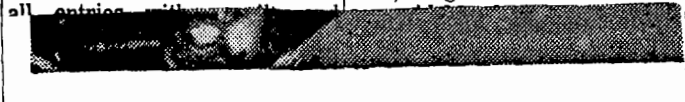
Once the system is fully operational, every county department will have access to their computer - stored records simultaneously.

Citizens visiting the treasurer's office to view tax statements, for instance, would be shown the data in seconds on large television-style viewing screens at the counter. If a copy is needed, high-speed typewriters will provide it in seconds.

# County Hopes It Won't Be Left Out

Snohomish County doesn't want to be left out in the cold when federal funds are

distributed for public health planning. So the Snohomish County Health District board has

been asked to help form an organization next year to determine what both lay people and professionals throughout the county want in health services. Then when funding is available for Puget Sound, Snohomish County can show its need.

In the organizational structure, hundreds of people representing all county residents would be involved.

Initially, says David Stockton coordinator for the county health district, each city council would appoint a community health committee. Another committee would be created for the unincorporated areas of the county.

That would make 19 committees, 18 for the cities and one for the county.

Each of the 19 committees, assisted by professional advisors if desired, would make recommendations to their respective councils or to the commissioners.

Recommendations which survived the city - council or commissioner test would be brought to a joint council made up of representatives from all cities and the county. Here too, professionals would act as advisors.

Then, since the legal authority of the joint council would be questionable, according to Stockton, any resulting recommendations could be passed on to the health district board, which is a legal identity.

State law declares that the health board in every county "shall have supervision over all matters pertaining to the preservation of the life and health of the people of its jurisdiction."

So when federal funding is handed out on a regional basis, as the Department of Health, Education and Welfare insists it will be, Snohomish County at least will be able to know what it wants - to a degree, Stockton believes.

Two communities in Snohomish County, Mountlake Terrace and Granite Falls, already have active health committees. In Mountlake Terrace a planned parent-hood clinic has resulted. Federal funding pays half the cost.

So next month - at the Health District's Jan. 7 meeting - the board will decide if they want more legal responsibility by fathering a new form of health planning for the county.

# Separate Health Department? Limited Courthouse Space Forces Offices to Move

The Snohomish Health District has been asked to look for a new home.

Dr. Clifford Anderson told board members yesterday that the courthouse computer will take the north side of the health district offices Jan. 1.

Vital statistics will be moved to the old radio building, mental health to the prosecutor's office and the health district conference room (where student nurses are trained) to the basement with the civil defense offices.

The clinic operation and administration offices of the health district will stay as they are — temporarily anyway.

The desegregation of the public health facilities for Snohomish County caused Dr. Anderson, the district's administrator, to suggest that the board think about new facilities — to house all phases of the health district.

He said that the dispensary at Paine Field was a possibility although the federal government has first choice. Also the county airport commission is interested in the buildings "and Paine Field already is an airport so it is a logical use."

Besides, a move for perhaps only five years, would be an unnecessary expense and long-range planning should be considered.

"It would cost quite a bit of money to fix the dispensary up," he added.

Board member Gene Fiege suggested that the health district consider asking for a government loan to build a "true community health center like they have in Bellevue and Vancouver."

The health district, however, has no authority to sell bonds. Funds for operation of the health district come from the state, county and per-capita funds. Cities already have voiced concern about a higher per capita rate. Presently they are charged 50 cents per capita.

"Couldn't we work to change the legislation so we can bond ourselves," asked Fiege.

The November election included a \$7 million bond issue to increase the size of the present courthouse. It failed.

County Commissioner Dick Fowler, also a member of the health board, said the resulting tower building, if the bond issue had passed, had one-and-a-half unassigned floors, ample room for the health district.

Anderson said that for now relocation of the three departments wouldn't be too bad. Vital statistics would have plenty of room in the old radio building — two rooms, one for the general public and a smaller private one. Often, he said, birth and death certificates are of an extremely private nature.

Beryl Manley and her mental health staff work close with the courts so a location near the prosecutor's office will work fine. There also has been some talk of mental health facilities moving to the Luther Child Center near Forest Park. Mental health soon will be taken out of the Health District organization completely and be directly under a separate board and

directly under the county commissioners.

In addition to health district board meetings, the conference room is used as a classroom for 10 to 20 student nurses from the University of Washington and other Seattle colleges.

The health district never will need less space, Anderson asserted as employees are stretched thin now so a new larger

location should be considered by the board now.

There has been some talk that sanitarians concerned with septic tank permits might become part of the county planning department. However, Anderson stated, he doubted if the county would be interested in including other phases of the sanitation department such as restaurant and meat inspections.
